# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In the 2020 Annual Report I talked about the impact COVID-19 pandemic had on the community in general and it being one of the toughest years for football. In 2020 we had a delayed start to the season but managed to finish the season with 10 games and the final series with one round washed out. We were all hopeful at that time that this was the end of COVID-19 and things were looking up and we could get back to some-kind-of-normal for season 2021.

As we all know this did not happen and in 2021, we started on time, lost two rounds to the rain and then the season finished at the end of round 13 due to the delta strain of COVID-19. We are now experiencing similar challenges to our way of life with the Omicron strain.

So my sincere thanks and appreciation to all members of our board, our coaches, players, training staff and all the volunteers associated with our club, including the many sponsors, individuals and families who have supported our club through these challenging times.

Season 2021 offered some real challenges and excitement especially with the appointment of new club coach Jordan Doering ably supported by Jason Tutt in the men's space and Britt Tully in the women's space. These three terrific leaders together with an exciting young list of local home-grown talent, both men's and women's program, sees us starting to realise the benefits of our investments in our junior players.

Unfortunately, the season started on a sad note with the passing of Harold Pennay on 31 March and Barry Browning on 1 April. Their contributions to the Ainslie Group were immeasurable – Barry in both football & business and Harry predominantly business. Their skills and acumen, sharp intellect and advocacy were paramount to ensure the future sustainability of the Ainslie Group.

In Round 1, our reunion weekend, we farewelled our longest serving coach Chris Rourke with a testimonial lunch on the Friday followed by the reunion dinner on Saturday night. Whilst it was a great weekend we unfortunately couldn't come away with the win in either 1st grade against Eastlake.

In men's 1st Grade we started off slowly but towards the end of the season we were showing plenty of fight and whilst we finished in fourth position it was clear that we were going to cause some pain in the finals. We'd beaten Belconnen twice and went close to beating Queanbeyan at their home ground, losing by only 4 points. A highlight was Leyton Chisholm's runner up in the Mulrooney medal count. Our men's 2nd Grade finished in second position after another great season however our men's Rising Stars finished in fifth position after winning the premierships last year.

Our men's 3rds and 4ths unfortunately missed out again in playing finals football. We have great numbers in

those teams who despite losing more than they win turn up every weekend to play. The camaraderie shown by those teams is fantastic. The depth in our numbers just illustrates the support these teams provide to our higher grades.

However, the most rewarding aspect of this year was the huge improvement in our women's program and a huge congratulations must go to coach Britt Tully and assistant coaches Greg Bishop, Sara Schirripa and Chris Tully. Throughout the year we consistently beat the top three sides from the past few years, Queanbeyan, Belconnen and Eastlake and we would have been rewarded with the minor premiership – had it been presented.

Acknowledging that AFL is a team game it's important to reflect on the individual league awards and congratulations to Britt Tully on winning her third AFL Canberra Bainrot medal for the Best & Fairest in the Women's 1st Grade as well as the 2021 UNSW Women's 1st Grade Coach of the Year. In second place was one of our up-and-coming juniors, Georgie Jacques, who was still eligible for Women's Rising Stars Under 18's.

It's also important to recognise the contribution of the women's 2nd Grade coach, Fiona Van de made. The community women's team improved their overall performance finishing in 9th position in a 12-team competition but worked closely with Britt ensuring a team approach, outcome.

A strong community football base is vital to the future of the game and remains a key priority for us. We are a proud and successful club. Our success has been built on the work of many individuals who, like us, have led this club and nurtured the broader AFL competition in Canberra. We are a club that is committed to success on and off the field and that success wouldn't be possible without our sponsors.

Our special thanks to our sponsors, firstly, the Ainslie Group, to Wayne Rogers and his board and Simon Patterson and his management team. In the last 30 years there have been many changes imposed upon the Licensed Club Industry. These changes have forced the Ainslie Group to adapt to these challenges and manage the risks involved. It's so reassuring in these uncertain times to have a such a supportive and strategically focussed group to ensure the future sustainability of the Ainslie Group.

Simon has led a team of staff and volunteers that has built the organisational capability of our club, managed our finances, contributed to ongoing stakeholder engagement across our community with important internal and external stakeholders, and managed the maintenance and development of our facilities to achieve seamless delivery of our football program.

Personally, I couldn't thank Simon enough for the support he's provided me in my role. It can be challenging dealing with the politics of NSW/ACT AFL and maintaining those relationships with our local clubs but he maintains his composure at all times. The good thing is he won't be lost to us and has taken on the Women's 1st Grade Manager role.

In farewelling Simon, I would like to welcome Matthew Diglio as his replacement. After an extensive recruitment process Matthew comes to us with a breadth of football administration experience in the SANFL and a recent 12-month stint at Eastlake FC.

## Strategic Plan

In March we held our strategic planning day inviting a good cross section of our community seeking suggestions for the big challenges the club should consider, discuss and plan to evolve over the next five years and to help us solve these key challenges.

Following on from that session, the AFC Board met on numerous occasions to distil these ideas and develop a strategic plan for the next five years. We have identified potential measures of success and nominated board

members to take direct responsibility for driving specific areas of focus.

We turned our discussions and key areas of focus into a one-page high level summary which were critically reviewed by the participants to see if our strategy makes sense and reflects the key priorities that we discussed on the day.

Based on that feedback we have refined our thinking further and look forward to launching our 2022 - 2027 Strategic Plan and kickstart our countdown to 100 years at Ainslie Football Club. Thanks again to all involved for your contribution to making our club a place where people want to be.

On 30 September 2021 Fiona Jolley resigned from our board. Along with a number of Director roles on other boards, the Australian Government recently appointed Fiona Jolly as Director of the Classification Board for a three-year term from 6 December 2021. As a qualified legal practitioner and an experienced CEO, Fiona will be sorely missed.

As well, one of the legends of the Ainslie Football Club, Brett Hannam, has decided it's time and is also stepping down from the board, primarily due to work commitments. Brett has been an Ainslie FC Board member since 2006 and is currently Senior Vice President. Brett has what can only be described as a very successful career in Australian Rules football. Commencing as an Ainslie junior in the U9's he went on to win five junior Best & Fairest including ACT U16 player of the year.

Brett played in six Senior Premierships and in 1990 was the only Ainslie junior to Captain Coach a senior premiership. He was Ainslie senior Captain/

Coach from 1989 to 1991, played 178 senior games, 21 ACT Representative games and was appointed ACT Captain Coach 1991 which went on to win the NSW Championships. He was also Assistant Coach with 2016 and 2017 undefeated 2nd Grade sides along with being a member of the 1977 Under 19's Premiership side and as a 37 year-old member of the 1997 2nd Grade premiership side.

In the mid 80's Brett spent 3 years at Central Districts FC in the SANFL and was appointed Captain in his 2nd year playing 45 SANFL games. As a result of Brett's contribution to the game, he was awarded Life Membership to the Ainslie FC in 2004 and inducted into AFL Canberra Hall of Fame in 2014.

Brett has made a huge contribution to the AFC and will be missed but rest assured he'll still be involved in some capacity.

In closing to my board thank you for support in what's been again a challenging couple of years. To Junior President Sue-Anne McKeough, Simon Holt and Matthew Teasdale. We've had some complex and sensitive issues in the junior space which have needed considered mitigation and to their credit they managed the situation exceptionally. To Mick Cawley in his role as Ainslie FC Secretary, my appreciation in holding us to account through your accurate recording of meeting minutes and action items. A challenging role however your high level of attention to detail and accuracy allows us to make strategic decisions with confidence.

# GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

I'm extremely excited to be part of the next phase of Ainslie Football Club's journey. Thank you to the board members, players, coaching staff, team management, volunteers, sponsors and the social club staff who have embraced me in my first few months. I look forward to working closely and building long-lasting relationships with you.

Thank you, Simon Holt, for the handover and guidance throughout my first few months. Simon has built high standards at the club, both on and off the field, and I look to uphold them.

“Brilliant”, “Devastating”, and “Incomplete” are just some words that reflect another Covid-19 shattered season. Last year I said that we would like to think the challenges of 2020 were an anomaly and would never be repeated, no such comments this time round.

Season 2021 was incredibly busy, uncertain and ultimately unfinished. It ended in no premierships, no finals but so much to value and look forward to.

The season ended with our Women's First Grade team on top of the table and on track to be Minor Premiers and in a wonderful position to win a Grand Final for the first time in 20 years. The return of some key players, a few new ones, the steady development of the talent coming through our junior program and an inherent belief that we were capable of matching and beating anyone has turned our women's football from a slow build into an imminent inferno. A women's football development day at the start of the year and a change in focus in our women's community team were significant components in creating a hungry and ultra-competitive women's first grade team. While still having 5 debutants to first grade in 2021, this was significantly down on the 16 debutants in 2020, reflecting a more stable line-up for the team – 16 of the team playing eight games or more of a possible eleven. In total 76 players suited up for our Women's teams, 34 players suited up for first grade and 63 players in community football (including 21 who played at least one game in both grades).

The improvements continue across the entire women's/girl's programs and we look forward to ongoing contributions from junior players flowing into senior football in the coming years.

Congratulations to player/first grade coach Britt Tully who led by example together with community coach Fiona Van de Made, well supported by Greg Bishop, Sara Schirripa, Chris Tully, Dave Mitchell, to name just a few, for their part in the women's program. Also to Zoe Lewis and Bec Veness and all their helpers in their efforts off the ground to make the football “just happen”. Plus the mountain of volunteers that see girl's junior football played every Sunday. Britt was awarded the league's 2021 UNSW Women's 1st Grade Coach of the Year.

The Men's Senior football program followed a very different pathway to the women's. With a significant number of players retiring, taking a break, off to country clubs, the 2021 men's senior squad was incredibly young. With such a loss of

experience and so many debutants, twelve across the season, it was no real surprise that the men's first grade team started slowly. Across senior football (first & second Grade) they played 63 different players, of which 40 played at least one game in first grade.

Two losses in the opening two games then led to three wins, including an important win over Belconnen. The teamwork improved, the decision making improved and the critical “trust factor” developed. By the time the season ended with another win over Belconnen, after losing away to favourites Queanbeyan with just seconds on the clock the week before, we seemed to be on track for a strong finish only for the season to stop dead.

Meanwhile the men's second grade continued on where they finished last year. With eight wins, one draw and two losses they were sitting second on the ladder. More importantly they continued to play expansive team football. With 48 players representing second grade it is a testimony to the coaching team and players that the focus is generally on the team and not the individual (each one desperate to make the step up into first grade).

Congratulations to coach Jordan Doering in his first year in the head coach role together with Jason Tutt, Jed Costigan, Brett Sheehan and Nathan Cawley to name just a few, for their part in the men's senior program. Also to Glenn Brown, Andrew Toy and Mick Cawley and all their helpers in their efforts off the ground to make the football “just happen”. Plus the mountain of volunteers that see boy's junior football played every Saturday.

Men's community football struggled somewhat in 2021. Third grade coach Russell Stewart had to stand down early in the season due to health issues and we were grateful for the willingness of Sean Vanholland to step into this role. The community teams were the first to play games in 2021 and it was terrific to get some ex-players down to present players jumpers to women's and men's community teams prior to the first game. A ridiculous number of injuries to players during the course of the season together with injuries in the senior teams put increased pressure on our ability to field teams every week. While this is a regular challenge in community football it is never easy to deal with and the club remains thankful of all the players/coaches understanding when this occurs. There were 48 players that donned the Red, White & Black in third grade, while an overwhelming 74 players turned out for fourth grade.

Our Rising Stars teams also dealt with their own challenges in 2021. Our women's teams battled valiantly with a very large squad of players week in week out. On top of that was the reality that there were six age eligible 18s girls playing women's first grade. Despite these challenges the girl's finished second on the ladder.

The men's 18s had their toughest season for a long time, with significantly smaller player base than in past years. A couple of early wins couldn't be replicated and while regularly in the games at half time couldn't finish off. Like the girl's team they lost two of their best players to the senior men's team.

Staying on field it is exciting to see where 2022 is heading. On a coaching front it is great that we will have Jordan Doering, Britt Tully and Fiona Van de Made returning. Meanwhile Harry Dunstall is back coaching the Men's Rising Stars while the Men's second grade and community teams will be coached by Ainslie juniors Nathan Cawley, Angus Nolan and Edi Marshall. We thank them in advance for their time, patience, energies and willingness to support theirs, and all our teams.

Meanwhile off field there remained of plenty of things to keep us busy. Early in 2021 the Board commenced the process of updating the club's Strategic Plan with a planning day including representatives from all our stakeholder groups. The feedback from those contacted will help us to develop a new strategic plan that reflects our goals and challenges in the next five years.

The day prior to the start of the senior football season the club launched a new book – "The Chris Rourke Years - Ainslie Football Club 2007-2020". A series of guests joined Chris and emcee Tim Gavel to discuss key aspects from his early days in football, significant people in his coaching, opposition players and coaches and players he coached. Books are still available to purchase. A special shout out to the crew that set the room up so well for this and the reunion event. But you can't refer to this wonderful piece of history without recognising the amazing efforts of the Hirst family in putting this together. Starting with a part written manuscript by his late father Lyndon Hirst, Jeremy Hirst together with mum Wendy and sister Aly have created a fitting tribute to Chris Rourke and the AFC. The enormous efforts from the entire Hirst family in putting it all together are valued well beyond words.

The following day saw our Premiership Reunion from teams that won in years ending in 9, 0 or 1. In total this comprised 17 teams across men's grades (1st, 2nd, 3rd, Monaro and Rising Stars) and our sole women's premiership in 2001. The event was cancelled in 2020 so it was exciting to finally be able to host it. One of the highlights of the evening saw the Women's team presented with Ainslie jumpers – a recognition not provided to them at the time.

Following its cancellation in 2020 it was a relief to get the RSM Business Lunch up and running again. This is our major fundraising event and thanks to the terrific work of Ian Muir and his band of helpers. Our guest speaker was Greg Ritchie and he was simply brilliant. He was easy going and absolutely hilarious. We were fortunate that covid restrictions had been eased just prior to the event allowing us to have over 260 people attend this Five Star event. If you haven't attended one yet, I strongly suggest you make the effort to come along.

Recent games against the Gungahlin Jets haven't generated too many memorable moments. However this year saw one of the youngest players in the Women's Team present an Acknowledgement to Country as part of NAIDOC week. Georgie Jaques initiated the presentation and it was heart warming to see the buy-in from players from both clubs together with the officials from the clubs and the umpires. We look forward to building on this in 2022.

August 7 was a massive weekend for the club. Saturday night saw the return of the Red, White & Black ball following tough games against rival the Belconnen Magpies. The event was brilliantly organised by Ian Muir, Zoe Lewis and plenty more. The feedback was outstandingly positive (as was the performance in the lip sync competition by one of the teams) and the event is bound to return on 2022.

Earlier in the day saw the unveiling of the Ian Muir Room, formerly the sponsors room. The contribution of Ian Muir to the Ainslie Football Club is simply enormous. His efforts on the field and off the field for our club is impossible to put into words. However, it can be said that Ian always gave 100% to his football as a player, and that in the years since retiring from playing his commitment hasn't waned. His connection to any Ainslie person, past or present, has to be seen to be believed. And the club is thrilled to be able to demonstrate a small token of its appreciation with the naming of the Ian Muir Room.

Special thanks to Michael Cawley and Andrew Toy in bringing the room to life and fit for it's new name.

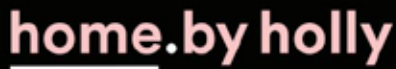

# SENIOR MENS COACH'S REPORT

The biggest change that has occurred within football operations at the Ainslie Football Club following the departure of long-time coach Chris Rourke has been time. My role at the club is on a part-time basis, alas very different to Rourke's full-time gig. This has necessitated that my focus be more on Men's Senior & Reserves footy whereas previously the additional hours allowed the Club Coach to be more involved across all teams.

The departure of Rourke triggered an opportunity for some to step away entirely from footy operations or do something different. This is nothing new for footy clubs, but it was the first time for 14 years that our club was impacted by this. The quality of the people that stepped away after 2020 was never going to be easy to replace.

## Coaches and Staffing

Other than Jason Tutt coming back and accepting the playing/senior assistant role along with Jed Costigan staying on to coach the reserves there were plenty of other positions I needed to fill - line coaches, bench coaches/roles and runners.

I was wrapped when Brett Sheehan accepted an assistant coaching role, he was a runner in 2021. Brett has been great this year, he has an immense knowledge of the game and has a really good relationship with the players. Nathan Cawley was keen to take on a greater role, and we were keen to develop him further as a coach. So, he has taken on a role of Opposition analyst - a newly created role - which he has done a fantastic job with. I am really excited for him to keep developing, and he has already shown a great understanding of the game for such a young coach. Kristen Woods was keen to get back involved in coaching and, coming on board a bit later than the others, took a little bit of time for her to find her feet and confidence. Woodsy has done a great job and understands the game really well and has really good insights.

Like any new group of people coming together it takes time to adjust to working with each other and more importantly getting to know each other.

As the head coach I made sure that each coach felt comfortable and understood their roles within the group. I encourage each coach to speak up and challenge each other also challenge me so we can all get better together. All being equal, all the 2021 coaches are keen to go on next year which is great. I look forward to planning 2022 with them.

## Strength & Conditioning /Physiotherapy

SportsCare coming on board in a new partnership with the club has been great. Brad Moore started the season with us and did a great job with the boys over pre-season, especially managing players with injuries. Unfortunately, timing wasn't great as Brad left to accept a job with the Brisbane Roar. This brought us in contact with Nyrie Atkin, who simply picked up where Brad left off

Sam Tickle joined us to look after the Strength and Conditioning side of things. Sam has been awesome in setting up the pre-season running and gym sessions. The care and interest that SportsCare have shown has been a massive positive and I am really looking forward to pre-season and working with Sam & Nyrie to develop the players even more.

During the year we established a Football Operations Team within the Men's Senior and Reserves teams. The purpose of this group is to catch up and talk about all things footy - both on and off the field. This consists of coaching staff, bench staff, medical team (Physio, S&C and Trainers) team managers. This has been very beneficial, an environment where people can speak up about how things are going in their area - good, bad or indifferent.

## Playing List -

When I was appointed the big challenge early days was getting around to all players and sitting down with them and discussing their plans for the 2021 season. We had a lot of players move on for different reasons - moving interstate, lure of country footy experience, retirement - which always happens. In all we lost a staggering 743 games of senior experience.

Any way you look at that is a massive number of games, experience and leadership. Having said that I knew that we had players that had been playing in our reserves for a period of time and some really exciting U/18's. When I interviewed for the job I said "I believe it's time to see if these kids can play"

After the pre-season we had I had pretty high expectations of the way I thought we would go this year. After the first couple of games losing the way we did Tutty and I quickly re-evaluated. We introduced a new game plan that suited our playing list better reflecting the age of the group and the number of new players arriving at the club.

This was a big change for a lot of the players as all they knew was Rourke's way of playing. We said to the boys it was going to take time and said it might take 10-12 weeks or right up to finals, but we will get there. Based on our results we kept on improving from Round 1 right through until we had to stop. Our last two games against Queanbeyan and Belconnen really showed that we have come on in leaps and bounds. We also have plenty more room to improve which is also really exciting for 2022.

## Recruitment & Retention

During the Covid shutdown period we have put together a recruitment and retention team (Ian Muir, Tutty, Aaron Wiley and me). We have had dialogue with some of the list that left in 2020 (Henry Delves, the Powell brothers, Hayden Armstrong, to name a few). All are saying they are really keen to come back for 2022. While their return is exciting, I believe with the development and progress of the current list we don't want to go out and massively recruit and stagnate the opportunity for players from this year. We want a good balance creating a healthy competition within the playing group, pushing each other to drive success.

This year we have had 11 players play their first senior game for the club which is a massive number and an exciting one. We have played 40 players again a very large number.

## Establishment of the Leadership Group & Team Culture

After losing the senior experience we had, I went about speaking to the players individually and as a playing group, we needed

new captain/captains and a leadership group. I was really keen for the players to be invested in the process so they would get behind the leaders they voted in.

Josh Maynard & Matthew Teasdale were elected joint Captains, with Mat Ackland, Billy Muir along with Two Young Leaders - Will Spencer and Harry Muir. We wanted these young leaders to develop their skills to become future leaders of the club, while I would benefit from their connection to a large portion of our list – a better connect for me.

Tutty and I have been working with the leadership group throughout the year developing them as leaders and assisting them manage being a leader while playing their own role. We are really thrilled how they are coming along as individuals and as a leadership group. We can see the difference in them as their confidence grows.

The leadership group has set the standards really well and are creating a healthy team culture amongst the group and I would say almost if not all players have bought in to what we are trying to achieve. There is still a lot of work in this area that we can do to keep achieving great team culture.

Each leaders has a group of players that they work directly with within the playing squad. With the leadership team driving this I wanted the players to take more ownership for their football and environment we train in. Each group had a task each week on a rotating roster - cleaning change rooms, cleaning gym area, packing equipment away, etc. I wanted the players to appreciate what they have and also what the volunteers also do for us as a football club.

Players also went out to a junior training session. It is really important for there to be a meaningful and tangible connection with the junior program. This area is still something I believe that can get better as we want our juniors coming to watch the senior footy as they are the future of our football club.

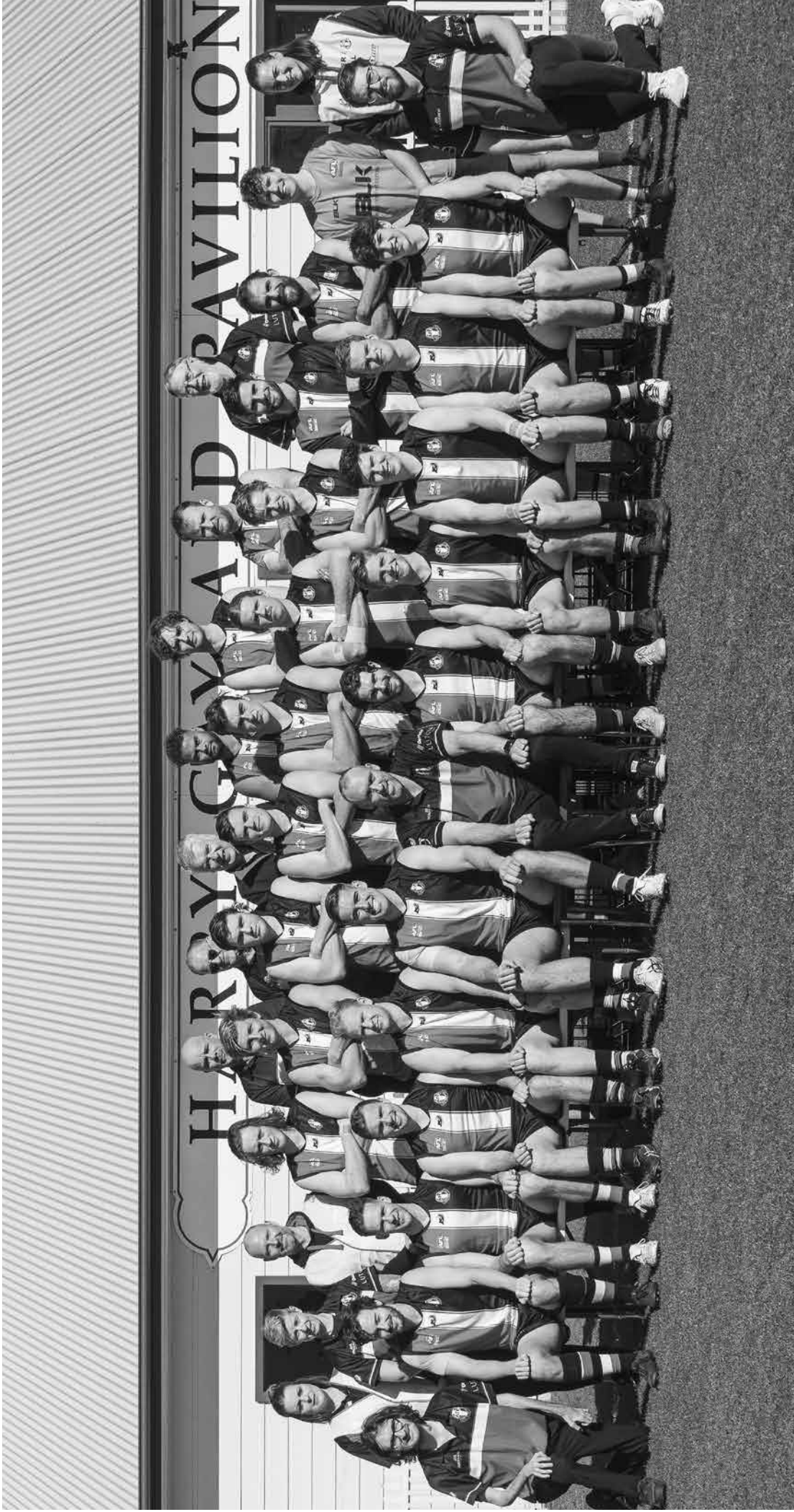
The improved focus on player social events and activities that bring the club together this year was a step in the right direction.

in providing an environment of high standards and culture. As members we are all responsible in upholding these values.

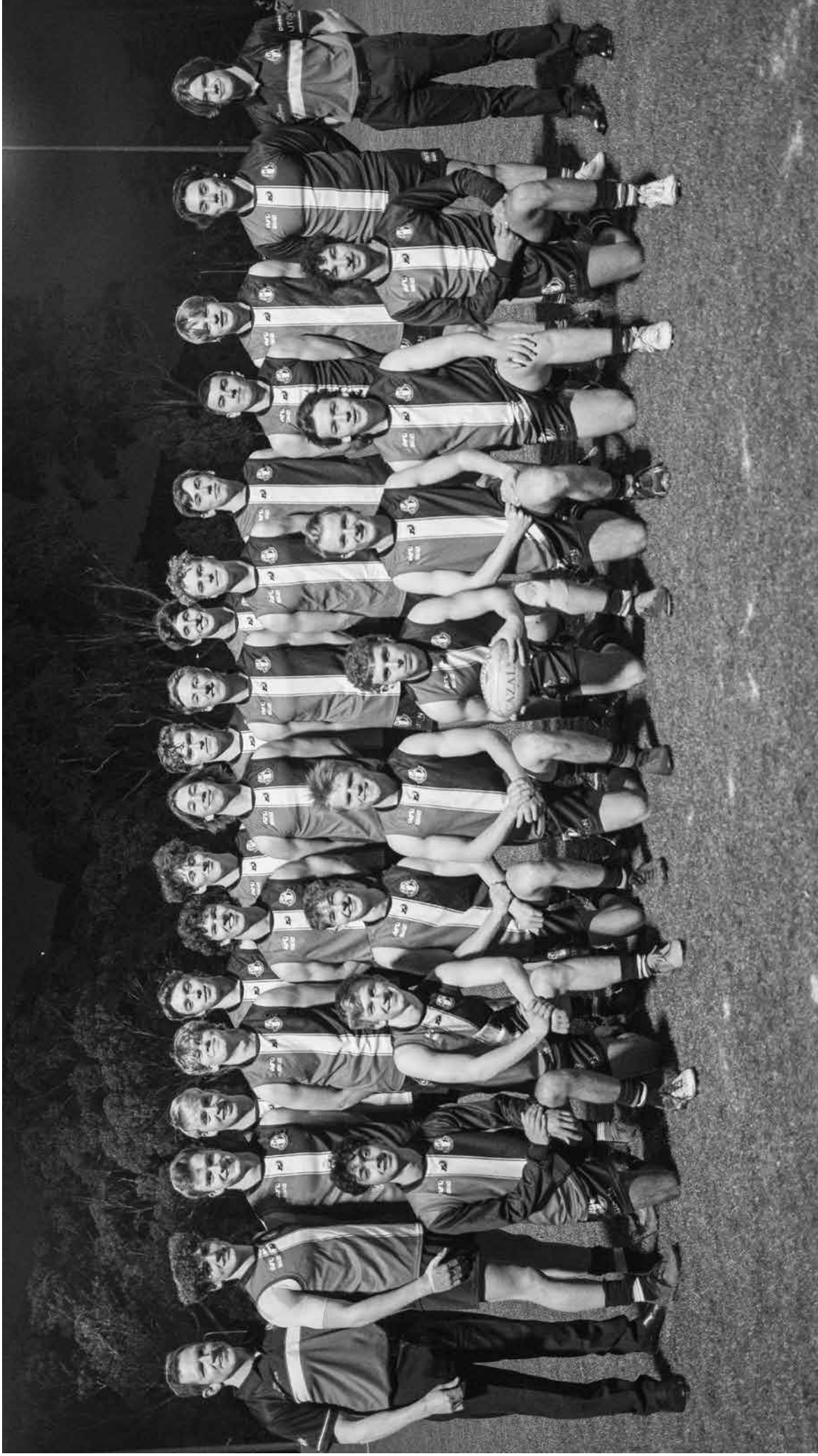
- Nicole Hyett and Alan Aves as team managers – thank you.

# WOMEN'S 2ND GRADE REPORT

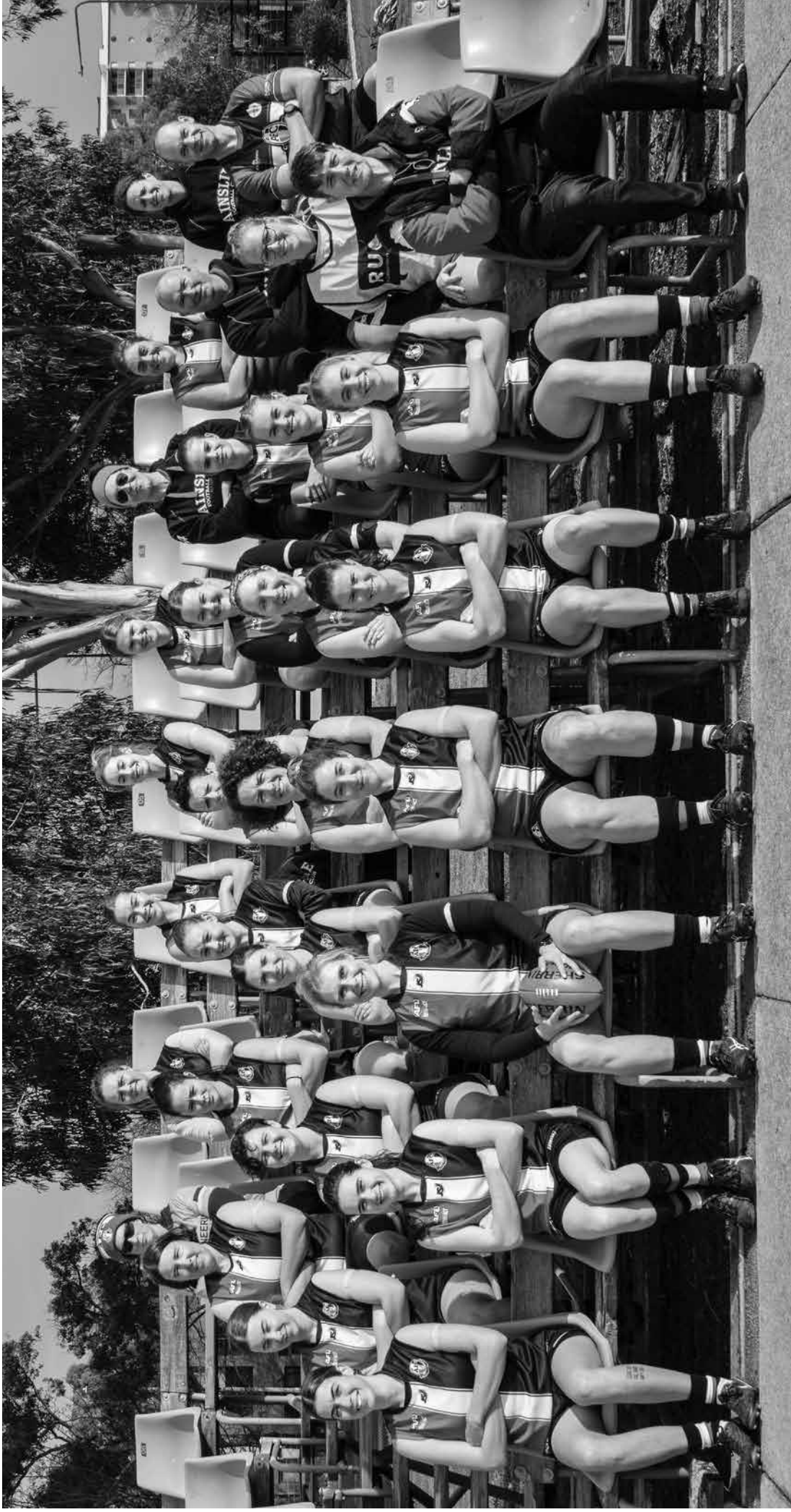
2021 was definitely the most successful season the team had with 5 wins and a lot of promise going into 2022.

**NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

The financial statements cover Ainslie Football Club incorporated as an individual parent entity, and Ainslie Football Club incorporated and controlled entities as an economic entity. Ainslie Football Club Incorporated is an association incorporated in the Australian Capital Territory under the *Associations Incorporation Act (ACT) 1991*.

**a) Principles of Consolidation**

A controlled entity is an entity controlled by the Ainslie Football Club Incorporated. Control exists where Ainslie Football Club Incorporated has the capacity to dominate the decision-making in relation to the financial and operating policies of another entity so that the other entity operates with Ainslie Football Club Incorporated to achieve the objectives of Ainslie Football Club Incorporated. All inter-company balances and transactions between entities in the economic entity, including any unrealised profits or losses, have been eliminated upon consolidation. Where the controlled entity has entered or left the economic entity during the year its operating results have been included from the date control was obtained or until the date control ceased.

**b) Basis of preparation**

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and *the Associations Incorporation Act (ACT) 1991*. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented within the statements and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

**c) New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted**

The Club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

**d) Statement of compliance**

The club is a not-for-profit, private sector entity which is not publicly accountable. Therefore, the financial statements for the Club are tier 2 general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements (AASB – RDRs).

**e) Critical accounting estimates**

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

*Estimation of useful lives of assets*

The Club determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

*Employee benefits provision*

As discussed in Note 16, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

**f) Comparative figures**

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

**g) Historical cost convention**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, other than where stated in Note 10 for Property, Plant and Equipment which is stated at cost or fair value.

**h) Current and non-current classification**

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification. An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current. A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

**i) Fair value measurement**

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market. Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

**j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Gaming revenue is recognised net of GST.

*Sales Revenue*

Revenue from the sale of goods and services is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

*Interest Revenue*

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

*Club Revenue*

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

*Fair Value Movement in Shares*

Movement in shares is recognised at the end of the reporting period based on the listed price at year end.

*Government subsidies*

Government subsidies are recognised on receipt or when presently entitled.

**Accounting policy**

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to prepare for their intended use or sale, are added to the costs of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use of sale.

All other finance costs are recognised in income in the period in which they are incurred.

**NOTE 4: INCOME TAX**

The Committee Members estimate that the cumulative potential future income tax benefit at 30 September 2021 in respect of tax losses not brought to account is \$1,020,588 (2020: \$840,387).

This benefit from tax losses will only be obtained if:

(i) The club derives future assessable income of a nature and of an amount sufficient to enable the benefit from the deductions for the losses to be realised;

(ii) The club continues to comply with the conditions for deductibility imposed by tax legislation; and

(iii) No changes in the tax legislation adversely affect the club in realising the benefit from the deductions for the losses.

Income tax is payable on that proportion of the income less expenses contributed by non-members. The aggregate amount of income tax attributable to the financial year differs from the amount prima facie payable on the operating surplus. The difference is reconciled as follows:

**NOTE 4: INCOME TAX (CONTINUED)**

**Accounting Policy**

The Ainslie Football and Social Club (the subsidiary) is taxed according to the principle of mutuality. The charge for current income tax expenses is based on the profit for the year adjusted for any non-assessable or disallowed items. It is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or are substantively enacted by the Statement of Financial Position date.

Deferred tax is accounted for using the Statement of Financial Position liability method in respect of temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. No deferred income tax will be recognised from the initial recognition of an asset or liability, excluding a business combination, where there is no effect on accounting or taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or liability is settled. Deferred tax is credited in the income statement except where it relates to items that may be credited directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax is adjusted directly against equity.

Deferred income tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future tax profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The amount of benefits brought to account or which may be realised in the future is based on the assumption that no adverse change will occur in income taxation legislation and the anticipation that the economic entity will derive sufficient future assessable income to enable the benefit to be realised and comply with the conditions of deductibility imposed by the law.

Ainslie Football Club is a sporting organisation under section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, and is exempt from paying income tax.

**Accounting Policy**

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

*Property*

Leasehold land and buildings are measured on the fair value basis, being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction. It is the policy of the club to have an independent valuation on a cyclical basis, with annual appraisals being made by the Directors.

*Plant and equipment*

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by Directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets.

An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

*Depreciation*

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over their useful lives to the club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

*Impairment of Assets*

At each reporting date, the club reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the Statement of Comprehensive Income. The Clubs land and buildings were revalued on 30 September 2020 by an independent valuers Knight Frank. Values were made based on fair value. Knight Frank in provided the valuation have reported that there is significant valuation uncertainty due to COVID-19

The bank overdraft, which was unused at year end, and the commercial facilities are secured by a first Registered Mortgage of Lease over the club's property at 52 Wakefield Avenue, Ainslie ACT; at 135 Gundaroo Drive, Nicholls ACT and 5 Angas Street Ainslie ACT.

Ainslie Football and Social Club Limited (Ainslie) entered a contract with Dexar Group Pty Ltd (Dexar) in November 2018. The purposes of the contract are for consultation and exploration of feasibility studies for potential supplementary uses and development on land currently owned by Ainslie. The potential minimum value of the contract is \$1,000,000 on delivery of performance requirements identified within the agreement. As at the end of the financial year a total of \$50,000 had been in total to Dexar since the signing of the contract.
