VALE MEMBERS

Keith Heales

Keith's over forty years of service to the football club took many forms. After arriving at the club in 1960 and retiring from playing in 1974, Keith played 106 senior games. His playing highlights included winning the 1961 First Grade Premiership and kicking 7.7 in a best-on-ground performance as captain of the 1967 Second Grade Premiership team.

Keith's dedication as an administrator was remarkable, serving as Club President for 11 seasons, holding the position from 1976 to 1981, 1986 and 1987, and from 2003 to 2005. During Keith's stints as Club President, Ainslie won three First Grade Premierships, seven Second Grade Premierships and two Under 19s Premierships. Keith was instrumental in recruiting Kevin "Cowboy" Neale to Ainslie as captain-coach in 1978, which set up a golden ear of success for the club through the late 70s and early 80s. In addition to his years as Club President, Keith was a frequent office bearer, serving at different stages as Ainslie's Senior Vice President, Vice President and Secretary. He also spent many seasons on Ainslie's match

committee, including our 1984, 1995 and 1997 First Grade Premiership seasons.

Due to his fantastic contribution to the club, Keith was awarded Ainslie Life Membership in 1973. As part of our 80-year club celebration, Keith was added to the Ainslie Wall of Fame at the south end of Alan Ray Oval and is one of only eight people to receive that honour. In 1981 he received a National AFL Merit Award for valuable service to Australian Football. In 2015 he was inducted into the AFL Canberra Hall of Fame.

Writing about Keith's contribution to the club in 2000, then Club President Gary Cox stated that "Keith epitomises what the club and football is about. His history in the club is well documented - his love for the game and the club is a lesson for us all. Well done Keith - you will be sorely missed". These words seem particularly poignant today as we reflect on Keith's contribution to the Ainslie Football Club.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I want to start on what might feel like a sombre note, yet this is an acknowledgment and celebration of what selfless people achieve when passion and dedication come together for a cause. I want to pay tribute to an Ainslie club stalwart, life member, Ainslie Wall of Fame, National AFL Merit Award winner, AFL Canberra Hall of Fame and all-round legend in Mr Keith "Barge" Heales. Keith passed away in late October at the age of 84 after a battle with dementia. Amongst the many accolades, Keith played 106 senior games, winning the 1961 premiership. As captain coach of the 1967 second grade premiership, in a Best On Ground performance, he kicked 7 goals, not to mention the 7 behinds as well. Keith coached, captain coached, administered, managed, and performed just about every role on the board, most notably he was the Ainslie President for 11 seasons across multiple occasions. Vale Keith Heales.

2022 was another big year for our club. Off the field we launched our new strategic plan and announced the club will provide equalisation across the men's and women's program as of season 2023. As the first known club in Australia to do so the motion is nonetheless groundbreaking particularly for a local sports club, when held beside the highly contested issue of wage variance and gender equality nationally.

With progression underway, the Board looks to increase the wellbeing of female players with levelling wages, increasing sponsorship funding, launching a new group made up of representatives for female teams, ensuring access to physiotherapy and specific change rooms and facilities. This is only the beginning as the flow on from addressing these gaps starts to reshape the image of equality in sport and encourage a perspective of fairness and acceptance out into the community.

On the field we were the AFL Canberra 2022 club champions, an award which reflects the success we had across the league and club in general. We competed in 3 grand finals, the Women's 1st grade, Men's 2nd grade and Men's Rising Stars (winning one of the three). We also performed well in the AFL Canberra individual best and fairest awards across all grades, with Mackenzie Carman winning the Men's 2nd grade award. Well done, Macca. We also had 14 Ainslie players making teams of the year.

In the Men's 1st grade we finished 3rd on the ladder losing to Belconnen in the Preliminary Final. With the return of a number of footballers from the country and our young list from 2021 we had high expectations with one of the best lists in the local competition. Eastlake suffered a huge player drain to the country, similar to us in 2021, which meant they weren't as competitive having played in the 2020 Grand Final. The Grand Final between

Queanbeyan Tigers & Belconnen Magpies was a nailbiter with the Tigers winning by 3 points. Our congratulations to Queanbeyan on a well-earned victory. They have certainly set the bar and we haven't beaten them in the last 6 outings.

We extend our thanks to this years coaching team of Jordan Doering, Jason Tutt, Brett Sheehan, David Evans, Kristen Woods and Team Manager Glenn Brown who has decided to after seven years to become the Team Manager for the Men's 3rd and 4th grades in 2023.

In the Women's 1st grade we went through the season undefeated only to lose to Queanbeyan Tigers at the last hurdle. What can we say, it's a movie script for the opposition and following on from finishing on top of the ladder in 2021. This will hopefully provide the hunger for them to get that elusive second premiership. You should all be very proud of how you represented your team and the club.

Our thanks to Brit Tully, who has signed on again as coach for 2023/24. Which is great news, and we wish you all the best. Simon Holt for managing the team and a special thanks to Greg Bishop, who's stepping away after 20 years as an Ainslie coach. It's probably hard to find someone here who hasn't been coached by Bish.

In the Men's 2nd grade another impressive year. After losing only one match during the year we unfortunately lost the Grand Final to Belconnen and that one match we lost was to the eventual premiers. Similar to the Women's 1st grade team it was a lot to process, yet the team can hold their heads high for what was an overall successful campaign.

Our Women's 2nd grade finished the season in a hard fought 8th. Towards the end of the season they had a sniff of the finals but unfortunately lost the last two games just missing out on finals yet put in a great effort throughout the year. Our thanks to Fiona Van de Made for your role as coach and all you have done for the club during your time with Ainslie. We support you in wherever you choose to focus your energy in 2023.

Scraping into the finals on percentage/finishing 4th on the ladder, 20pts and half the amount of percentage behind the minor premiers (Queanbeyan), the Men's Rising Stars team went all the way to win the Premiership. Another fantastic effort from Harry "Super Coach" Dunstall having won the 2020 premiership as well.

Last, but not least, the Men's Community Grades (3rds and 4ths). They finished down the lower end of

the ladder, however we have to acknowledge that with many clubs only fielding teams in community grades it is always hard when your 3s and 4s are playing opposition 1s and 2s. The boys lost a number of close games and yet managed to form a great bond which will take them comfortably into 2023 with confidence. Regardless we thank and acknowledge the contributions of Angus Nolan, Eddie Marshall, Giles Tranter, Renee Chaustowski and special thanks to Josh Butcher and Peter Schroder for their assistance throughout the year

With the Men's 1st grade two-year coaching role ending on 30 November 22 a subcommittee was established to thoroughly evaluate the coaching job and whether it should be advertised or renewed. The final decision was that moving towards the proposed new Sydney competition and expanding KPIs, the position needed to be rewritten and to ensure we are getting value for money the decision was made to reapproach the market.

After a comprehensive recruitment process Jason Tutt has been signed on for seasons 2023/24 as the Ainslie Senior men's playing coach:

As most of you know Jason was an Ainslie junior (he played Rising Stars at Ainslie but junior footy at Tuggeranong), as was his dad, uncle and brother. Having made his senior debut for Ainslie at the age of 15 he was drafted by the Western Bulldogs at pick 31. He also played for Carlton, finishing with playing 40 AFL games.

Jason will be assisted by a new addition to the coaching team in John Harper (Harps). John will be an asset to our coaching team, players and club, and we welcome him back to Ainslie.

We would like to thank Jordan Doering "JD" for his involvement with the club over the past four years. JD came to Ainslie as a player in 2019 and had instant success winning a first-grade premiership. In 2020, in addition to playing, JD became a senior assistant coach to Chris Rourke. We thank JD, his wife Kaz and their family for their time, passion and commitment shown to Ainslie over the past four years and wish you all the best with your next venture.

Our sincere thanks and appreciation go to all our members, coaches, players, training staff and all the volunteers associated with our club, including the many sponsors, individuals and families who support our great club, for your hours of effort and commitment, which doesn't go unrecognised.

A strong community club, and more importantly football base, is vital to the future of the game and remains a key priority for us all at Ainslie. Our success has been built on the work of individuals who come together to support

and form teams to test themselves year on year against other likeminded teams/clubs striving to be the best at their level.

Many have a personal affiliation with Ainslie, yet some just know someone who knows someone else and are drawn to be a part of a community, hoping to achieve something great. Together you lead this club and nurture the broader AFL competition in Canberra.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

2022 will be remembered for the number 237. Dani Curcio broke the club first grade senior games played record as she ran out onto Alan Ray Oval in the qualifying final against Belconnen. Dani not only sits at the top of the games played list, but her name now sits on top of the 'Dani Curcio Scoreboard'. Dani is truly a club great and embodies the Ainslie Football Club (AFC) ethos.

AFC women's football continued to showcase its strengths with Georgia Clayden and Tess Cattle both debuting in AFLW in 2022. AFC supporters adopted the Gold Coast Suns while we cheered on Georgia throughout the season and on her win for the Suns Player's Player award. We all supported Greater Western Sydney Giants on the way to watching Tess debut in Round 10 against the Suns.

2022 also showcased AFC as the best senior club in the competition, winning the senior club championship – the best performing club across all senior grades during the regular season .

Our Under 18s Men's Rising Stars completed a fairy-tale season, scraping into finals by percentage and going on to dominantly win on the big stage. Having a successful Under 18s season showcases the emerging talent at the football club, with so many of the premiership players eligible for Under 18s footy again in 2023 and some 2024! Men's team manager and stalwart of AFC Glenn Brown - who was always behind the scenes keeping the team organised and continually going above and beyond - hung up the team manager's notepad at the conclusion of 2022. Glenn decided to take a step away from the men's 1s and, as he's told us, he has promoted himself to the men's community grades team manager role. Thank you Glenn for your contribution. A big thank you to Jordan Doering for his two seasons as men's first grade coach. Jordan was pivotal in bringing players back from country football to pull on the tricolours again in 2022. Jordan built great standards at the club and throughout his coaching tenure at the club, did a great job in steering a young and inexperienced playing list. Thank you Jordan for your contributions throughout your time at AFC, it was a pleasure to work together. Thank you to the collective volunteer group Jason Tutt, Brett Sheehan, David Evans, Kristen Woods and James Horniblow. Congratulations to Jack Powell who was runner up in the AFL Canberra Best and Fairest award. Well done to our men's AFL Canberra Team of the Year representatives Matthew Teasdale, Jason Tutt, Guy Richardson, Jack Powell and Henry Delves.

Men's first grade player Leyton Chisholm has departed Canberra for Adelaide and has excitingly signed for SANFL club Central Districts. Well done, Bobby, we are very proud and will be watching the Doggies games in 2023.

The women's second grade had the loudest crowd of the season at Alan Ray Oval in Round 11 against the ADFA Rams on a cool July Wednesday evening. The game was attended by all grades and supporters but most notably the men's community grades showed their support of the women's team in a memorable match. The women's 2s had a great mid-season run winning four out of five consecutive matches. Thank you to Fiona Van de Made and Collette Reedy for steering the women's reserves ship, the hard work that goes into each training session and gameday for a coach and team manager is immense.

The men's community grades 3s and 4s had their first win against Molonglo since the 2014 grand final. The 3s had a lot of close games this season and are building the platform for a strong 2023. We had players that played men's 3s and 2s footy. Oliver Hicks debuted for Ainslie FC in the 3s, played the following week in the 2s and the next game in the men's 1s – a great example of depth and importance of our squads. Community grade men's football was important in binding the football club together; hosting an accolades day where all 100 games players were recognised, a Red Cross blood donation drive, setting up the players quiz night which was attended by women's reserves players too.

This season saw an upgrade to the internals of the Harry Gaylard Pavilion. The area has been repurposed with a second changeroom added, a new space for the gym and a dedicated history room. SENIOR MENS COACH'S REPORT

At the commencement of Season 2022, my key focus areas for the men's senior teams were:

1. Continued progression of coaching team along with maintaining a positive culture amongst the group.
2. Development of the playing squad (recruitment/retention, fitness, individual development, team culture).

Coaching Staff

The senior coaching team (Jason, Kristen, Brett, Nathan and myself) formed a strong bond during 2021 despite all obstacles presented through the pandemic and a shortened season. We had established roles and found a groove in these positions however through consistent collaboration continued to identify areas for improvement.

After seeking feedback from the playing group, an area identified was the need for more one-on-one development. In response, I appointed Dave Evans as the Head of Development and Hayden Armstrong who took a line coaching role.

With Nathan taking over the reserves head coaching role this allowed for further depth in the seniors coaching development plan and was a celebrated success given he was able to coach the team to the Grand Final.

Playing Squad

The disappointing season that was 2021 saw an invigorated response in players keen to return to AFC for the 2022 season. This was an exciting prospect for the club and for me as a head coach. In planning for 2022 I was inspired by the return of talent and experience to see just what we could create, of course the premiership being the ultimate goal.

Its pleasing to say AFC saw 4 junior players progress to debut in their first senior game of football - Ollie Phillips, Tom Hincksman, Ollie Hicks and Flynn Woodward. Additionally, another 4 players made their senior debut for AFC this year.

Seeing the junior players progress was extremely pleasing and recognition of the long-term development path I set in 2021/2022 being executed successfully.

Season 2022 started convincingly winning 4 of the first 5 games. Unfortunately, the excitement that had surrounded the return of experienced and senior players to cement our position for 2022 was somewhat cut short with a number of debilitating injuries and unavailability within the senior playing group. The loss of Josh Maynard, Luke

MEN'S RISING STARS (U18s) COACH'S REPORT

After two COVID disrupted seasons (2020 and 2021), the 2022 season was as close to 'normal' as we could have hoped for. We lost no football to lockdowns, although our last game of the home and away season was a 'washout', with our season being played through a pretty cold, wet and windy winter – which of course is what makes football in Canberra so special!

We started out with our usual Ainslie pre-season in early November 2021, which involved seniors down to under 15s - both men's and women's teams. We had a lot of players turning up as AFL Canberra had decided that for the 2022 season we would have an Under 16s and 18s competition, instead of the usual Under 17s/18s combination, so a lot of the 17 year olds were keen to push for a spot in the Rising Stars team – although, in the end, AFL Canberra reverted back to an Under 17s competition (rather than Under 16s) after the first round of the Rising Stars competition.

Pre-season training was fun, and as we finished up for Christmas there was a lot of excitement and anticipation about a COVID-free season. Unfortunately, the end of 2021 and early 2022 saw the onset of the Omicron wave and the COVID isolation rules challenged the early part of the new year, but we were lucky enough to get our pre-season training underway in February 2022, pretty much on schedule, as well as our season start in the first week of April. In hindsight, while we had various players miss training and a game or two through COVID throughout the year, we came through the season fairly unscathed from a pandemic perspective!

As usual, the Rising Stars group got together before the season start to determine the values and behaviours that would guide their training and playing performance, as well as their behaviour off-field. The following is taken from the Team's Values Statement that the players developed as a group:

Values

Sportsmanship – We play the game the right way.

Respect – We respect each other, our Club, the opposition, umpires and all others.

Competitiveness – We always give 100% and are accountable for our actions and inactions.

Honest Communication – We are open and honest in our communications on and off the field. We provide positive and constructive feedback.

Behaviours

We achieve our Values through our Behaviours, including the following key behaviours:

Sportsmanship

On field – Concentrate on football only (don't get caught up in silly stuff); always shake hands at end of game

Off field – 'One team'; we 'get around' each other

Respect

On field – no back chat to umpires; shake hands with umpires

Off field – Clean up change room after game - both home and away, but especially away

Competitiveness

On field – Give 100% effort at all times – game (and training)

Off field – always have positive body language around the club

Honest Communication

On field – Positive directional talk; getting around each other; constructive not negative criticism

Off field – be proactive in communications (eg telling coach cannot make training etc).

I think the team worked hard throughout the year to give effect to our Values and Behaviours – and it was pleasing to see many of the players mature over the year and take the next step in their development both as players and as young men.

The 2022 Rising Stars was a real mixed bunch and it took us all season to come together as a playing unit - we had many players who had not played together previously - some coming from Sydney, the Coast or from the Riverina. We are also a very young team, with most players eligible for Rising Stars next year as well, and we also had four 16 year olds (who are with the Giants Academy) who were a core part of the team – when they were not on Giants duty.

The 2022 Rising Stars had a slow and disrupted start to the season, with half the team away for our second game which was then followed by two byes. After a disastrous game against the Jets, our round 5 game against top of the table Marist was our best to that point, with most of the team available, and for the first time, we started to play as a team rather than a group of individuals - in the end, we were very unlucky to go down by three points on a pretty miserable day. After another bye, the boys started to turn things around – we welcomed our captain, Josh Porter, back for his first game of the season – then reeled off 3 wins in a row. Unfortunately, we then went back to being inconsistent for the remainder of the second half of the season, and with our last game against Marist being a washout, we scraped into the finals finishing fourth ahead of the Jets on percentage.

That said, player unavailability each week was a significant contributor to our inconsistency, and we were only able to get our best team on the ground once during the season. Nevertheless, as I kept saying to anyone who would listen(!), I always thought that, if we could get close to our full strength team on the ground, our best football was the equal or better of other teams in the competition, and I

was confident we would be competitive across the finals series (assuming we got there – which we did in the end).

I would also like to recognise the role of the leadership group as well over the season – the members of this group (who were voted on by the playing group) also played a huge role in building and maintaining the team culture, and getting the group to bond and become a solid playing unit - particularly the captain, Josh Porter, and vice-captain, Zac Noack, both of whom always led by example on and off the field - as well as the other members – Jules Bacchus, Jesse Dunstall, Lachie McCormack and Luca Drury (one of the Under 16s) – all of whom have grown into good leaders.

In any event, when we scraped into the finals, we knew that it was going to come down to us being able to play three good games of football. It was pretty clear that the hardest team to beat was going to be a full strength Queanbeyan side, which we expected to meet in the Grand Final, if we got there. However, after just scraping through against Marist by three points in the elimination final on a wet day at Alan Ray Oval, we ended up having to play the Preliminary Final against Queanbeyan the following week - at Queanbeyan. With the regular coaches – Teasdale, Maynard and Ackland – unavailable and having to get ready for their own final at Belconnen, I called on the inspirational coaching talents of some of my 2020 Rising Stars and current senior players – Ollie Phillips, Jarrod Lynch, Callum Klep and Joel Dunstall - to take on assistant duties – and they did not let me down, with great coaching insights and working with the backs, forwards and mids at each of the breaks. After being down at half time, we made a few positional changes for the second half which turned things around for us. With only two points separating the teams at three-quarter time, the last quarter was one of the best quarters of football ever, with goals being kicked at each end and the lead changing four times. In the end, we held on for a fantastic four point win, leaving only the Grand Final against Belconnen to go.

On a nice morning at Football Park, we knew we had to get off to a good start – so the boys went out like they had all season and promptly went a goal down. But the boys steadied with our first goal (a nice effort from Tully Froggatt roving off a forward 50 contest), and then it was pretty much one way traffic for the rest of the game, although we let them back in for a couple of cheap goals in the last quarter. Having watched the replay now a few times, it was a great effort by the entire team, although special mention must go to the back 6, led by the Captain,

who were just awesome all day with intercept marks, switches and hitting targets. And a long bomb (from outside 50) by Riley Hamilton for a goal in the second quarter, and a couple of special marking highlights from Jesse Dunstall which helped him secure the medal for best on ground, also got the vocal Ainslie supporters up and about.

I would like to thank many people for their help and advice along the way. First, huge thanks go to the Rising Stars manager, Liz Matthews, for her tireless efforts to organise the team and manage logistics, as well as helping the other senior teams on game day. Also, a big thanks to the assistant coaches - the Seniors' captains Matt Teasdale and Josh Maynard, as well as Mat Ackland on game day. I would also like to thank Dave Evans for his coaching expertise – and limitless supply of training drills - and helping the boys at training during the second half of the season. Thanks also to all our other parent and supporter volunteers – timekeepers, water carriers, runners, physios and others.

Also thanks go to the outgoing senior coach, Jordan Doering, for his support to me, and patience on training nights! Also, thanks to General Manager Matthew Diglio for his tireless work in running the club and dealing with AFL Canberra, and to Lee Phillips and the rest of the Ainslie Football Club Board for setting and leading the club culture.

I will finish this report in a similar way to previous years – by giving my thanks to the playing group (and their parents!). It was a pretty special year – a Grand Final win that looked the remotest of possibilities for most of the season. But underlying this was the incredible development of the playing group over the year, their growth both as individuals, but importantly also as a team, some wonderful football from time to time (and some pretty average football for a lot of the time to be fair!); but really overall it was a fun season (despite the miserable weather!). From my perspective, it was a great pleasure and privilege to coach the team.

I look forward to seeing the progression of the older players into Divisions 1 and 2, and seeing the younger players back for another year of Rising Stars where they will be vying for positions with a new group coming up from the 17s. I wish the 2023 Rising Stars all the best for a successful and fun year.

2022 was the first year since 2019 we were able to play a full season with 16 rounds + finals. Ainslie pre-pre-season kicked off prior to Christmas with all teams across the club (both seniors and juniors) welcomed to train together, meet other players and coaches.

In January women's teams were back at it hitting the track. It was great to see regulars and new faces coming out to pre-season training, getting ready for a bumper year especially the ones' girls who were undefeated since round 4, 2021 with their finals season cut short thanks to Covid.

Both teams had a solid 3 months training finishing off pre-season with the Queanbeyan Cup with a team made up of First and Second grade players. SENIOR MEN'S 4S (Community 2s)

COACH'S REPORT

At the end of the 2021 season, the 4th grade team, and the community squad as a whole faced a significant challenge. Over the previous two seasons, a less-than-insignificant number of players had moved on from the club or football and the coaches had also moved on. Results had been poor but perhaps most importantly there were a number of forfeits throughout the season.

In order to rectify this the community brains trust of coaches Angus Nolan and myself, Giles Tranter & Rene Chaustowski decided that the goal for our season should be to create an enjoyable environment fit for community footballers to enjoy their football and increase participation. Our measurables were to ensure there would be no forfeits, increase the squad size to over 70 and lay the groundwork to develop the squad as footballers in future seasons to start to see some positive results.

Throughout the pre-season both before and after Christmas effort was done in establishing a culture centred around 4 key values developed with the squad. We set on: Accountable, Competitive, Good Communicators and Good Blokes and the squad went about trying to bring people into the fold who embodied these four values. Sessions were run with this in mind and by the end of pre-season we had a squad of roughly 50 committed players and a number of fringe 'call me when you're short' type players.

The first round performance filled me with confidence for the season as we managed to fall just short of Molonglo with a large number of first year players in the mix. The results however would not come as we continued to face challenges in continuity of players. Being a community squad, players are not expected to plan their winters around football, and with the borders being open for the first time in years, as well as the persistence of Covid-19 it became very difficult to continue to put the same side on the park throughout the year. This makes getting results in a league as the only 4th grade side in the 4th division very difficult.

Despite the challenges, we were able to put a side on the park each week, on occasion this meant some players playing two games in a weekend and getting a few retired stars off the couch. Without those efforts, 20-or-so players who would otherwise not get to play a game of football that week. Reflecting on the season I think the club should be very proud that it is the only club with a side in every senior competition.

There were many on-field highlights to speak of, mainly around the development and arrival of some fantastic people in and to the squad. The squad welcomed players from near and far, Mitchell and Lachie Bryce joined us from Tuggeranong. Rogan Turner and Liam Baker joined

us from Broken Hill after first training with Belconnen. Riley Schipp who had moved down from Darwin, Josh Roberts joined us from ANU where he spent 2 seasons without having the opportunity to play a game. We also welcomed an assistant coach in David Kusetic from Molonglo. There were many people new to the game from Canberra as well who just wanted to be part of the experience such as Taylor Johnston, Aidan Johnson, Sam Taylor and Tom Nicholls who all had fantastic first years of playing senior footy.

There were plenty of highlights off the field as well, Dom Hale and Josh 'Ainslie Mod-Guy' Butcher who were the leaders of our social scene. This included, in addition to a fantastic night at the RWB Ball, organising trivia a night, partners' day where money was raised for Meridian, Silly Saturday and a Melbourne footy trip all of which will not soon be forgotten by the players. We also were able to, when fixtures allowed support the other Ainslie teams, including cheering on Coach Gus after a trip to Bateman's Bay was washed out, supporting the Women's 2nd grade team (every Saturday, but also) when they were able to play a Thursday night game at ARO. Personally, the most memorable moment of the year was the last round where a presentation was organised by Josh, and delivered by Lee Phillips to all of the players (including myself) who reached a milestone during the season. The recognition, which has been sorely missed by those who have played in the squad over the last few years.


For all of the reasons above and more, I would like to thank General Manager Matthew Diglio, as well as usual suspects Simon Holt, Ian Muir and the President Lee Phillips for the opportunity to coach this year. I would like to express my sincere gratitude to all the names aforementioned for their support throughout the year. After 20 years at Ainslie as a junior and a senior, I can safely say that this was my favourite season of football, regardless of the results on the field. I am happy to say that we have already received confirmation from over 60 players at the time of writing who will be back again next year. Further, the brains trust and I are looking at offering an opportunity to continue playing football to Senior footballers who have not been able to or may not wish to continue playing high-level senior football and, perhaps more importantly, Rising Stars players who may not have the opportunity to otherwise continue with senior football.

JUNIOR PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2022 was a much simpler year for junior football than the previous two COVID-impacted seasons. For the first time since 2019, junior players completed an entire regular season and finals, with the only disruption to the intended 14-round schedule being a league-wide washout in August.

Ainslie fielded 20 junior teams in 2022, two fewer teams than in 2021. Of these 20 teams, we had 13 mixed teams, five youth girls' teams and two boys' teams. Ainslie fielded teams in every possible age group except Under 10s girls. Our overall number of players across the junior program in 2022 was 485, a total player decrease of 8% compared to our 2021 total of 528 players.

COVID presented week-to-week challenges for teams, especially those with lower numbers. It was not uncommon for coaches to lose upwards of five players in the days leading up to a game due to sickness and COVID isolation protocols. However, it's a credit to our coaches' and managers' ability to coordinate with players, parents, and other officials that we kept the number of forfeited or postponed games across our junior program to a minimum.

Another challenge facing some coaches and managers this season was extended benches, with several age groups having too few players for two teams but a greater than an ideal number for one. I want to thank parents and players for their understanding and patience with issues

surrounding game time, and I appreciate the efforts made by coaches to ensure all players receive a fair amount of time on the field each week.

Although winning should never be the focus of junior sport, the return of finals in 2022 meant that some teams could compete for finals success. We're incredibly proud of our Under 16s Girls team for winning their grand final this year. Other Ainslie teams to compete in junior finals were:

- Under 11s Mixed Black
- Under 12s Mixed
- Under 14s Mixed Red
- Under 14s Mixed Black
- Under 14s Girls Red
- Under 17s Boys
- Women's Rising Stars

In addition to these teams that made finals, several groups showed tremendous improvement in 2022.

Throughout the season, I was consistently impressed with the adherence teams showed to Ainslie's junior values of Fun, Participation, Skill Development, Sportsmanship, and Community. I want to acknowledge the critical role coaches and managers played in demonstrating these values to their players and parents. Additionally, I thought the concern coaches and managers showed in 2022 for player welfare was admirable.



NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements cover Ainslie Football Club incorporated as an individual parent entity, and Ainslie Football Club incorporated and controlled entities as an economic entity. Ainslie Football Club Incorporated is an association incorporated in the Australian Capital Territory under the *Associations Incorporation Act (ACT) 1991*.

a) Principles of Consolidation

A controlled entity is an entity controlled by the Ainslie Football Club Incorporated. Control exists where Ainslie Football Club Incorporated has the capacity to dominate the decision-making in relation to the financial and operating policies of another entity so that the other entity operates with Ainslie Football Club Incorporated to achieve the objectives of Ainslie Football Club Incorporated. All inter-company balances and transactions between entities in the economic entity, including any unrealised profits or losses, have been eliminated upon consolidation. Where the controlled entity has entered or left the economic entity during the year its operating results have been included from the date control was obtained or until the date control ceased.

b) Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented within the statements and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

c) New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted. The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the financial performance or position of the Club.

The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations are most relevant to the incorporated association:

Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting (Conceptual Framework)

The Club has adopted the revised Conceptual Framework from 1 October 2021. The Conceptual Framework contains new definition and recognition criteria as well as new guidance on measurement that affects several Accounting Standards, but it has not had a material impact on the Club's financial statements.

AASB 1060 General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities

The Club has adopted AASB 1060 from 1 October 2021. The standard provides a new Tier 2 reporting framework with simplified disclosures that are based on the requirements of IFRS for SMEs. As a result, there is increased disclosure in these financial statements for key management personnel and related parties.

d) Statement of compliance

The club is a not-for-profit, private sector entity which is not publicly accountable. Therefore, the financial statements for the Club are tier 2 general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements (AASB – RDRs).

e) Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and

assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Club determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in Note 16, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

f) Comparative figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

g) Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, other than where stated in Note 10 for Property, Plant and Equipment which is stated at cost or fair value.

h) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification. An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current. A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Club's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

i) Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market. Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

The Committee Members estimate that the cumulative potential future income tax benefit at 30 September 2022 in respect of tax losses not brought to account is \$1,172,392 (2021: \$1,020,588).

This benefit from tax losses will only be obtained if:

(i) The club derives future assessable income of a nature and of an amount sufficient to enable the benefit from the deductions for the losses to be realised;

(ii) The club continues to comply with the conditions for deductibility imposed by tax legislation; and

(iii) No changes in the tax legislation adversely affect the club in realising the benefit from the deductions for the losses.

Income tax is payable on that proportion of the income less expenses contributed by non-members. The aggregate amount of income tax attributable to the financial year differs from the amount prima facie payable on the operating surplus. The difference is reconciled as follows:

Accounting Policy

The Ainslie Football and Social Club (the subsidiary) is taxed according to the principle of mutuality. The charge for current income tax expenses is based on the profit for the year adjusted for any non-assessable or disallowed items. It is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or are substantively enacted by the Statement of Financial Position date.

Deferred tax is accounted for using the Statement of Financial Position liability method in respect of temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. No deferred income tax will be recognised from the initial recognition of an asset or liability, excluding a business combination, where there is no effect on accounting or taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or liability is settled. Deferred tax is credited in the income statement except where it relates to items that may be credited directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax is adjusted directly against equity.

Deferred income tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future tax profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The amount of benefits brought to account or which may be realised in the future is based on the assumption that no adverse change will occur in income taxation legislation and the anticipation that the economic entity will derive sufficient future assessable income to enable the benefit to be realised and comply with the conditions of deductibility imposed by the law.

Ainslie Football Club is a sporting organisation under section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, and is exempt from paying income tax.

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

Property

Leasehold land and buildings are measured on the fair value basis, being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction. It is the policy of the club to have an independent valuation on a cyclical basis, with annual appraisals being made by the Directors.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by Directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets.

An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over their useful lives to the club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the club reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the Statement of Comprehensive Income. The Clubs land and buildings were revalued on 30 September 2020 by an independent valuers Knight Frank. Values were made based on fair value. Knight Frank in provided the valuation have reported that there is significant valuation uncertainty due to COVID-19
